16 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Hello.

17 MICHELLE: Hello, this is Michelle with the Baez
18 Law Firm.

19 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Hi, how are you?

20 MICHELLE: I'm doing really good. How are you
21 doing?

22 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Fine. Can you hear me?

23 MICHELLE: Yes, I can hear you. [REDACTED] told me
24 that you were going to call, so I'm here and wanted to

1 go ahead and get some, a little bit of information
2 from you. So you tell me a little bit about, well
3 what you know and then we'll go on from there.

4 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Okay. I'm going to give you
5 the short version of the story. All right.

6 MICHELLE: Yeah, that will be -- actually that'll
7 be great. You know, you got me while I'm away from
8 the office, so I'm trying to look for a pen here. So
9 hold on just one second if you don't mind.

10 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Okay.

11 (Pause)

12 MICHELLE: There we go, I knew I had a pen here.
13 Okay, you can go ahead.

14 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Okay. A few months ago Maya
15 Derkovic, she -- I called her my daughter. Okay.
16 Here we have like prison daughters, prison, you know,
17 sisters and stuff like that. And she was watching the
18 News one night and Casey Anthony was on the News, and
19 she started telling me that she was in jail with the
20 girl and both, you know, they were friends and Robyn
21 Adams and her were friends and that Maya was friends
22 with Robyn Adams' parents, and blah-blah-blah-blah-
23 blah.

24 So I started asking her questions. And the

1 bottom line is this, she sit down with me, made up the
2 whole murder -- made up everything. [REDACTED]

8 Okay. Bottom line, it's a lie. I can polygraph
9 that I sit with her when she made up this story. It
10 is not true. The real story that she told me what the
11 girl told her is nothing that any of you have, that
12 she hasn't even told because I've never seen it on the
13 News. She's never said a word because she doesn't
14 think anybody would believe her, and Maya just made up
15 this whole thing.

16 So. Maya contacted -- well, actually I helped her
17 contact the detective. So we got in touch with the
18 detective. His name is [REDACTED] We got in touch
19 with the detective, they came out here to see her.
20 When she came back from the visit that day, from the
21 detectives she basically said that they did not --
22 well there's a lot of details, but I'm just giving you
23 the short end. Okay.

24 Bottom line was --

1 MICHELLE: Of course, of course.

2 INMATE LUNCEFORD: -- they didn't really give a
3 shit if she was lying or not. That they only really
4 had circumstantial evidence against the girl and that
5 they wanted something solid to convict her of a death
6 penalty. Okay. So with Robyn Adams' and with Maya's
7 statements that they could seek the death penalty.

8 And so I ask her, and personally the reason that
9 I could believe that they said this to her is because
10 in my case I am the victim of prosecutorial misconduct
11 and prosecutorial vindictiveness. My -- the
12 prosecutor involved in my case, [REDACTED]
13 [REDACTED], got fired. Okay. And they basically -- I
14 went from a three-year plea bargain to natural life
15 because I wouldn't testify and lie the way that they
16 said.

17 Okay. So I believe what she said. They
18 basically filled in all of the holes for Maya and
19 basically told her -- what she didn't make up, okay,
20 they basically told her. So for months I've known all
21 this and I've kept my mouth shut.

22 Therein me and Maya get in an argument over
23 money. [REDACTED]

24 [REDACTED]. She started going seeing the inspector.

1 Basically she came out of there and I told her, I
2 said, "Maya, if you do this deposition" because
3 they're supposed to deposition her like next week or
4 soon. They're supposed to do a depo on her. I said,
5 "If you do this depo, you're gonna be in violation of
6 perjury". I said, "The bottom line is they're gonna
7 polygraph you. [REDACTED]

8 [REDACTED] Okay. "And then you become, you
9 become liable for perjury if they catch you in a lie."
10 She didn't want to hear that.

11 So then I tried to tell her, well I don't think
12 you should go through with this because they're gonna
13 find out. They're just gonna find out and it's gonna
14 be ugly.

15 But her words to me were that the inspector of
16 this prison -- his name is Inspector Lingus (ph), the
17 inspector of this prison and the detective are working
18 together and they do not care because it's a child
19 case. It's one of the biggest cases in the State of
20 Florida and they know she's guilty, but they really
21 can't prove it. And that they said that it doesn't
22 matter, they're still doing the deposition with her.

23 So when me and Maya got into the argument I told
24 her, I said, well you know what I'm going to contact

1 my lawyer, I'm gonna tell the truth and that's the
2 bottom line. Because now if this does happen and
3 later down the line something comes up and says, well
4 Robin Lunceford knows the truth then I'm going to be
5 subjected to some bullshit.

6 So I told her, I said, Maya I'm gonna tell the
7 truth. I'm gonna tell these people that you're
8 fucking lying. So she went to the inspector and she
9 called Detective [REDACTED] again. She came back with
10 a message from them. Okay.

11 Now mind you I have not talked to the inspector
12 and I have not talked to the detective, so I do not
13 know if this is true, these threats are true that they
14 -- that I'm getting ready to tell you.

15 The message was that if I tried to contact you
16 people and if I tried to tell the truth - because I
17 was gonna call the media if I couldn't get in touch
18 with you I was just gonna say fuck it and call the
19 media - if I did, for one, they would do everything in
20 their power to keep me in lock, bury me in
21 confinement, turn me CM, and the detective would --
22 now, see this is the only reason I believe he said
23 something to that effect, Maya's 21-years old, she's
24 not the brightest pea in the pod. I study law. I was

1 going to Blackstone Law School and I know legal
2 terminology. She does not.

3 Now when she told me that, and I know this is
4 true because I've seen it happen, that because -- and
5 she knows my post-conviction is in and that I'm
6 getting ready to go for my evidentiary hearing on my
7 natural life sentence for fucking petty theft is
8 bullshit, that the detective said that he knows
9 prosecutors and that the state attorney here would
10 make sure that the state attorney in Miami doesn't do
11 anything for me, and I will stay in prison the rest of
12 my life if I report this to you that she's lying.

13 So there's your short end of it. Now mind you I
14 have not heard the detective or the inspector say
15 these things, but Maya does not know any of these
16 legal terminologies and know that actually that can
17 happen because it happened in my case. Okay.

18 So now I'm not one to take threats very lightly.
19 Okay. And I don't know if you know Frank Rubino but
20 that's my lawyer, he's in Miami. Frank Rubino and Jon
21 May. I have one of the biggest attorneys in Miami.
22 Okay.

23 So now here's my thing. Today --well yesterday
24 the truth came out. Everybody in the penitentiary

1 found out that Maya was lying, the whole prison found
 2 out. Because her and her girlfriend got into a big
 3 fight. Okay. And her girlfriend told her I cannot
 4 believe that her own girlfriend -- it was only me and
 5 Maya that knew that she was lying. She had never
 6 really told her girlfriend that she was lying. So
 7 when her girlfriend found out that she's just a
 8 pathological liar, they got into a big fight. So Maya

18 Now, I mean, you would think that they would get
 19 in touch with the state attorney or since they're such
 20 buddy-buddies with [REDACTED] that they would call and
 21 say, well maybe your state witness is lying and maybe
 22 you need to do some further investigation, but of
 23 course not. They did not do that.

24 But just so you know if you need to get records,

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5 Now the one thing that she did tell me, one of
6 the reasons that she did her media saying when she
7 went on the news for channel -- ABC 9 Orlando, when
8 she went on there the full reason was because she
9 wanted to receive pen pals because she said that
10 Charles Manson receives pen-pals, that Scott Peterson
11 receives pen pals, and if people see her on the media
12 that they'll write her again.

13 Well lo and behold she went on there and told the
14 people to Google her and now she's got a river of pen
15 pals that are writing her because now she has a fan
16 club.

17 So she, this girl is a very demented girl. She's
18 pathological, she's a pathological liar. She's a --
19 just demented. Okay.

20 So the bottom line is I'm probably gonna be
21 retaliated against for this phone call. I'm probably
22 gonna get fucked -- there's no telling what's gonna
23 happen to me, but really I don't give a rat's ass.
24 But the point is whatever you want me to do, ma'am,

1 I'm more than willing. If you need to polygraph me,
2 you need to come on out here tomorrow, and I can
3 polygraph to everything that I just told you. And
4 that's it, and that's all. If you need to do a depo
5 on me, I will do a depo because she's lying.

6 MICHELLE: Yeah. Well thank you for contacting
7 us and what I need to do is I know that you're telling
8 me this and I'm trying to jot everything down, but it
9 would be great for you to speak to Jose.

10 Is there any way that you could give me back a
11 call in about five -- five minutes if you don't mind?

12 INMATE LUNCEFORD: I sure can.

13 MICHELLE: Because I need to get a hold of him.

16 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Hello.

17 ATTY. BAEZ: Hello, is this Jose Baez.

18 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Hi, how are you, sir.

19 ATTY. BAEZ: Good. How are you?

20 INMATE LUNCEFORD: I'm fine.

21 ATTY. BAEZ: Thanks for calling me. I appreciate
22 your calling me.

23 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Okay. Listen I only got [REDACTED]

24 [REDACTED] so I'm going to have to talk fast. So what

1 I'm going to give you --

2 ATTY. BAEZ: Okay, go ahead.

3 INMATE LUNCEFORD: I'm going to give you the very
4 short version. Okay.

5 ATTY. BAEZ: Okay.

6 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Okay. I just explained it to
7 your secretary, whoever that was, but I'll just give
8 you the short end. Bottom line.

9 Me and Maya Derkovic were friends. She was like
10 my little daughter. Okay. While she was sitting
11 watching the news one night -- hold on.

12 (Speaking to third party: Yeah, thank you)

13 Okay. She was watching the News one night and
14 they had the Casey Anthony case on there and she
15 started explaining how she was in jail with her, her
16 and Robyn Adams and they were friends and blah-blah-
17 blah and then out of nowhere she started creating a
18 story.

19 And she started asking me [REDACTED]
20 [REDACTED] "Oh, well what can I get out of this
21 if I know about the murder" and this and this and
22 this. And I said, well if you're a state witness you
23 can get a lot. You can get a downward departure, you
24 can get, you know, you can get a lot of things done.

1 In such a big case and -- you know, I basically brang
2 it down to her.

3 Well, she said, okay, I wonder if I don't know
4 stuff and that I can, you know, just make stuff up. I
5 said, well you know you'd have to be awful good to
6 make something up.

7 So anyway, the bottom line is we sit and created
8 that she actually created the whole murder. Okay?
9 She wrote letters to Robyn Adams, [REDACTED]

15 The reason for this, and this went on for like a
16 month. The reason for this was that they wanted to
17 have their stories together and to see if they both
18 agreed so they both could get something out of this.

19 In Maya's room she has correspondence with Robyn
20 Adams' family, the whole nine yards -- has a Bible
21 that they sent her, the whole nine.

22 Okay. So anyway, this is fine. That was her
23 business. And then me and Maya got into an argument.
24 Okay. It was over money. Okay. And basically I told

1 her, I said, you know, first of all Maya if you do
2 this deposition, they're supposed to come and do a
3 depo on her -- this [REDACTED] guy, he's the
4 investigator for the State Attorney -- if you do this
5 you're going to end up getting caught up with perjury.
6 I said, because you can't pass a polygraph test. I
7 said because the bottom line is [REDACTED]
8 [REDACTED] [REDACTED]
9 [REDACTED]. They're going to want to polygraph you
10 and you can't pass. I said, and regardless of what,
11 you know, you're gonna end up getting perjury. Okay.

12 Well after she had talked to [REDACTED] and the
13 inspector of this prison -- now mind you I have not
14 spoke with either, I have not spoke with the inspector
15 and I have not spoke to [REDACTED], but this is what
16 she told me when she came back. That they basically
17 did not give a shit if she was lying. Okay. But the
18 case only had circumstantial evidence, he knew that
19 and in order to get a death row conviction he needed
20 something more and that this was just perfect. Okay.
21 So that he was willing to use her and Robyn Adams.
22 All right.

23 Now when I told Maya --

24 ATTY. BAEZ: Who said that actually?

1 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Huh?

2 ATTY. BAEZ: Who had said that exactly?

3 INMATE LUNCEFORD: [REDACTED]

4 ATTY. BAEZ: Okay.

5 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Now mind you I am the victim
6 of prosecutorial misconduct. Okay. My -- the state
7 attorney in Miami got fired because of the stuff that
8 she did, and you know I went from three years to
9 natural life because I did not lie in the case. She
10 actually wanted me to just outright tell a big fat
11 whopper and it just got real ugly and I ended up
12 getting the rescinded I thought.

13 Anyway, so Maya talked to him again because I
14 told her, I said, "Well Maya you know what I'm not
15 gonna get caught up in this bullshit, I'm gonna to
16 tell my lawyer. My lawyer is Frank Rubino and Jon
17 May. I have the biggest attorneys in Miami". Okay. I
18 said and the bottom line is, to cover my ass, I'm
19 going to tell my lawyer, okay, the truth. And I said
20 that I'm gonna contact this girl's lawyer. Okay.
21 Because you're not gonna get me caught up in no
22 fucking bullshit and then later call my name and say I
23 knew you were lying in a homicide.

24 So she goes and sees the inspector and she talks

1 to [REDACTED] on the phone. Now mind you I did not,
2 you know, talk to either one of these people. But
3 when she came back she said -- there was a message for
4 me, that if I did contact you and that if I did talk
5 and tell and ruin his case that he would make sure
6 that my post-conviction would not go through because I
7 have an evidentiary hearing next month, and my co-
8 defendant went from natural life to three years, and I
9 have a great chance of getting out.

10 He said that had pulls at the state attorney --
11 this is what he's telling Maya, and that he would make
12 sure that the people in Miami gave me no plea
13 bargains, no deals, nothing. I would remain with my
14 natural life sentence if I said anything.

15 Well first of all I don't take threats very
16 lightly because I would just tell them basically to
17 kiss my ass. Okay. So now -- and she did say that
18 the inspector said --

19 ATTY. BAEZ: (Indiscernible).

20 INMATE LUNCEFORD: That the inspector said that
21 he would bury me in confinement and he's been looking
22 for a reason just to bury me in confinement. Okay.

23 So today, oh and last night, yesterday her
24 girlfriend -- Maya Derkovic's lover, found out that

1 she lied about a lot of things and broke up with her
2 and they got into a big fight. And the whole prison
3 found out that Maya had been lying in the murder case,
4 because before she was like a little celebrity and
5 then they found out she lied and it was horrible. And
6 she [REDACTED]

11 [REDACTED] And I -- bottom line, I said I can
12 polygraph to everything that I just said. Okay.

13 Two, and this is something I forgot to tell you,
14 there is a lot of things that I will not say over this
15 phone but I can't. I can only say to you in person.

16 ATTY. BAEZ: Okay.

17 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Okay, because these phones are
18 recorded.

19 ATTY. BAEZ: Okay.

20 INMATE LUNCEFORD: But also [REDACTED] asked
21 Maya, and apparently Maya told him that you were
22 having a relationship with your client; a personal
23 relationship. And [REDACTED] was trying to push her
24 in that area also.

1 Now here's my thing, okay, sir, I've done a lot
2 of time in prison, over 20 something years. You know
3 I was going to Blackstone Law School and my best
4 friend is a paralegal, I'm not dumb by far. All that
5 legal terminology that she came out of there with,
6 Maya Derkovic is 21-years old and dumb as a sack of
7 rocks. There is no way that she could have known any
8 of that unless a detective told her any of that.

9 Okay. And she said that everything -- now before
10 we got into the argument, when she talked to [REDACTED]
11 [REDACTED] the first time, she said that he filled in all
12 the blanks for her to make sure that they get a death
13 row conviction. And everything that I've just told
14 you I --

15 ATTY. BAEZ: Maya told you?

16 INMATE LUNCEFORD: -- can polygraph to. Huh?

17 ATTY. BAEZ: Okay. Maya told you -- Maya told
18 you that [REDACTED] had filled in all the blanks for
19 her?

20 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Yes.

21 ATTY. BAEZ: Okay. Let me ask you, let me ask
22 you a couple of questions.

23 When did that conversation between Maya and [REDACTED]
24 [REDACTED] take place?

1 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Okay. Well I'm sure that you
2 could get the prison records because he came out here
3 to see here. It was a few months ago.

4 ATTY. BAEZ: Okay. Oh, so it wasn't a phone
5 call, it was a meeting.

6 INMATE LUNCEFORD: No, they had a visit.

7 ATTY. BAEZ: Okay, all right.

8 INMATE LUNCEFORD: And since then they've had
9 phone calls.

10 ATTY. BAEZ: And

11 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Huh?

12 ATTY. BAEZ: And since then they've had phone
13 calls?

14 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Yes.

15 ATTY. BAEZ: Okay, all right. Um, now --

16 INMATE LUNCEFORD: So I'm not sure what
17 repercussions I'm gonna have to face for telling the
18 truth, but like I said on my statement if I'm gonna
19 get punished for telling the truth then so be it. Let
20 the games begin because I've got a pit bull as a
21 lawyer. Okay. And here's my thing --

22 ATTY. BAEZ: No, I know Frank Rubino is one of
23 the best lawyers in all of Miami.

24 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Yes, and so here's my thing --

1 ATTY. BAEZ: If I could --

2 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Here's my thing, first of all
3 the reason, the real reason that Maya claims that what
4 really happened in your client's case is something
5 that she should have said from the beginning, but the
6 point is they've made this murder up. Everything that
7 Maya has said is -- she made it up. I can polygraph
8 that I actually sit with her while she made the story
9 up. Okay.

10 So now --

11 ATTY. BAEZ: The two of you were talking about --
12 what? When you say the two -- that you made it up.
13 How do you know she made it up?

14 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Okay, well the part of --

15 ATTY. BAEZ: Did she say, Should I say this or?

16 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Well because we deliberated.
17 We sit and went back and forth about what to say about
18 when the police came and told her they found the body.
19 Yeah, I mean we went through five different scenarios
20 of what she should say. And the whole -- I can tell
21 you stuff that's in your report, from the notes that
22 they showed on the media, the notes that you have from
23 that interview, I can probably read it back to you
24 because I -- yeah, I sat right there with her when she

1 made it up. So there's no possible way that I could
2 know any of it because I don't have it in front of me,
3 but I can break it down to you and tell you how she
4 made it up. Where it came from, word-for-word.

5 ATTY. BAEZ: Wonderful. Okay. Let me ask you
6 this --

7 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Yeah.

8 ATTY. BAEZ: The -- [REDACTED]

9 [REDACTED]

10 [REDACTED]

11 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Yes, yes.

12 ATTY. BAEZ: -- in Robyn Adams' family. Do you
13 know who that person was?

14 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Yes, [REDACTED]

15 [REDACTED]

16 [REDACTED] But I do know that Robyn Adams'
17 mother or father or somebody in her family corresponds
18 with Maya and they have given her a Bible, sent her a
19 Bible before she left.

20 Okay. So now I don't know how you want to
21 proceed with this. [REDACTED]

22 [REDACTED]

23 [REDACTED] but I just want
24 to let you know --

1 ATTY. BAEZ: That's okay, let me -- let me tell
2 me, let me ask you one last question.

3 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Okay.

4 ATTY. BAEZ: Do you know who -- which family
5 member from Robyn Adams, Maya's mother was giving the
6 letters to?

7 INMATE LUNCEFORD: I want to say her mother. I
8 want to say Robyn Adams' mother, but I can't be 100
9 percent sure.

10 ATTY. BAEZ: Okay. All right.

11 INMATE LUNCEFORD: I don't know --

12 ATTY. BAEZ: Let me do this, let me say this.
13 I'm going --

14 INMATE LUNCEFORD: -- I don't know, if --

15 ATTY BAEZ: -- to call -- okay. I have to call
16 Frank Rubino and ask him for permission to come see
17 you.

18 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Okay, and that's fine.

19 ATTY. BAEZ: So I'm going to call him tomorrow.
20 I'm going to ask -- I'm going to call him tomorrow and
21 ask him if I can do so. Have you --

22 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Okay.

23 ATTY. BAEZ: -- spoken to him? Did you tell him
24 you were going to --

1 INMATE LUNCEFORD: No, I have not. I wrote him a
2 letter and I knew it was the weekend and he's usually
3 in Columbia. You know, he does a lot of work in
4 Columbia, so I haven't been able but I did write a
5 letter. He should be receiving it, him and Jon May.
6 But you can get in touch with them --

7 ATTY. BAEZ: Okay.

8 INMATE LUNCEFORD: -- and just let them know
9 that, you know, I've been trying to get in touch with
10 them so that I could tell them, but I did put it in a
11 letter. They should be receiving that letter this
12 week. I put everything in the letter to advise him
13 because I'm not gonna get caught up in no freaking
14 perjury.

15 ATTY. BAEZ: No, no -- you're absolutely right
16 and this is the smart thing to do, and there is
17 nothing better to do than just come out and tell the
18 truth. If everyone would just do that it would save
19 me a lot --

20 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Well, yeah -- and the thing
21 is, the thing is I've had numerous problems with these
22 inspectors in this institution. I don't know if you
23 know but like the prison system is very corrupt. The
24 officers, you know, it's just not rehabilitation here.

1 And I've had numerous problems and the one inspector
2 got fired behind, you know, me -- his name was
3 [REDACTED] and then this new inspector seems to
4 have a big grudge against me.

5 Now mind you I did not hear him say anything of
6 these negative things towards me so I cannot say that
7 he actually did partake in all this. Okay. I'm only
8 telling you that Maya --

9 ATTY. BAEZ: Okay. Let me, let me get -- all
10 right. Let me get your correct spelling of your name
11 and your date of birth.

12 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Okay. My date of birth is
13 11/4/62. My name is Robin, R-o-b-i-n --

14 ATTY. BAEZ: Okay.

15 INMATE LUNCEFORD: -- Lunceford, L-u-n-c-e-f-o-r-
16 d.

17 ATTY. BAEZ: Let me, that's L-u-n-c-as in
18 Charley-e-f-o-r-d, right?

19 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Yes.

20 ATTY. BAEZ: Okay. And your case was out of
21 Miami?

22 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Yes, and my evidentiary
23 hearing is next month and I've probably got the,
24 probably the best chance in the world of getting

1 reversed and remanded, and I don't need no threats
2 from a prison inspector or a corrupt state attorney
3 that they're gonna contact my county and make sure
4 that I don't get anything good to happen to me if I
5 tell the truth. What kind of shit is that?

6 ATTY. BAEZ: I don't know.

7 INMATE LUNCEFORD: And first of all Maya is only
8 21 --

9 ATTY. BAEZ: I can tell you -- while I can't make
10 any promises, I can tell you that the judge that's in
11 charge of this case now is the Chief Judge, and will
12 certainly -- would certainly not allow any of this
13 nonsense to happen. So --

14 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Well, okay, they say that now
15 but --

16 ATTY. BAEZ: I will --

17 INMATE LUNCEFORD: -- when I, Frank knows what
18 happened to me before and that's why I've got life --

19 ATTY. BAEZ: Right.

20 INMATE LUNCEFORD: -- on the reoffender act
21 because they screwed me because my -- how do you go
22 from three years to natural life? It's crazy.

23 ATTY. BAEZ: Yeah, no, I understand.

24 INMATE LUNCEFORD. You know. Okay, listen --

1 (To third party: Hold that door Pat)

2 ATTY. BAEZ: But you've got a great lawyer.

3 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Okay, well, good. Listen if
4 you need, [REDACTED]

5 OPERATOR: You have one minute left.

6 INMATE LUNCEFORD: [REDACTED]
7 [REDACTED]
8 [REDACTED]
9 [REDACTED]

10 ATTY. BAEZ: I will, I will --

11 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Okay?

12 ATTY. BAEZ: Okay, I will be in touch [REDACTED]
13 and we'll probably come up and see you soon. Okay?

14 INMATE LUNCEFORD: That's very good. Very good.
15 And you tell Frank that he can give me a legal call.

16 ATTY. BAEZ: Okay, Robin, thank you. Okay,
17 great. I will do that.

18 INMATE LUNCEFORD: Okay. Thank you, bye-bye.

19 ATTY. BAEZ: Thank you so much. All right,
20 Robin, bye-bye.


